At the I Care Vision Center, we are focused on direct patient care. While the political climate of healthcare remains uncertain, I Care San Antonio continues to be the consistent vision care provider to those who cannot afford it. Our mission is to remove the barriers and fill the gap of providing complete eye care to those who are uninsured and the growing underinsured population. We are only able to accomplish these goals because of our generous donors and outstanding volunteer doctors who dedicate their time and resources both in Central Texas at the I Care Vision Center in San Antonio and internationally through our Global Medical Missions program in 19 different countries.

In this annual report we are pleased to highlight all of our accomplishments in 2017 including special emphasis on three programs; Eye on Diabetes, iCare4kids and Senior Vision Care. These programs are making a significant impact in the lives of individuals as one patient stated, "Cataract surgery hasn't improved my life, IT HAS SAVED MY LIFE! I could not drive or perform my duties working on office equipment. Without I Care's help, I would have had to apply for disability benefits."

Locally this year, I Care San Antonio's volunteer doctors performed over 377 major eye procedures including laser, cataract and retina surgeries. The total value of all donated eye care was an impressive \$884,235. Internationally we co-sponsored \$20 million worth of healthcare through our partnership with Medical Ministry International and the direct impact in all of our patient's lives is immeasurable.

We depend on, and are grateful for, all you do to support I Care San Antonio. Your kindness enables our work every day. You are the reason lives are improved and even saved.

A few weeks ago my wife, Belinda and I heard a sermon on contentment and how it's hard to find in our lives. I'll always remember a patient at one of our two week mission trips to Mexico a few years after I started going on those trips in the early '90s.

Late one afternoon a middle aged man came through the line and told us he had lost his job as a ranch hand because his eye sight was so poor he could no longer do his job. He had a wife and several children that depended on him and he was out of a job and out of money.

When we saw his prescription we knew just how bad his eye sight was, and we also knew that we probably couldn't help him. After looking and looking our fears were confirmed, we didn't have anything that would even come close! Then someone suggested that we look in the women's glasses. After just five minutes, we found a pair of glasses that had almost the exact prescription that he needed. Hallelujah! Until we looked at them at least. They were an old pair of women's glasses made for a little woman and this rancher was a big man. We bent the temples out as far as they would go and then put them on him. The next thing I knew

he jumped out of his chair, tears starting to run down his cheeks. He grabbed each one of us and gave us all hugs, repeating over and over again, "God Bless you." Work came to a halt in our department for a few minutes as we hugged each other and marveled at God's provision. This man could see again! Which meant he could find work again and support his family. What a Joy!

In December of 2017, I finished my 23rd year as president of ICSA. It's time for someone else to take the helm and bring new ideas and energy to this great organization. I plan on assuming more of a servant's role in the years to come and look forward to seeing what God has in store for me and for ICSA. It's been a wonderful journey so far and I look forward to more moments of contentment, peace and joy!

The Gift of Sight

I Care San Antonio (ICSA), founded in 1992, is a faithbased, medical non-profit organization managed primarily by volunteer doctors.

Locally, we accomplish our mission by providing complete eye care at the I Care Vision Center located next to the Haven for Hope campus. This program serves low income (150% and below the federal guidelines on poverty) and homeless people in Bexar and the surrounding counties who do not have any type of health insurance. Or have health insurance with a deductible so high compared to their income, it acts as a barrier to receiving vision care.

Internationally, we partner with Medical Ministries International to co-sponsor over 50 medical mission trips. In addition, each year, we lead a team to assist with vision care in an impoverished country.

EYE ON DIABETES

Eye on Diabetes is a vision program that provides comprehensive eye care, from screenings to surgeries, for people with diabetes living in poverty.

hen it comes to the health problems deemed "epidemic" in Bexar County – diabetes is at the top of the list. The portion of adults in Bexar County who have diabetes has steadily increased to 14% in 2014. In Bexar County that amounts to 255,600 people living with this debilitating disease.

The goal of the Eye on Diabetes program is to help diagnose, prevent and treat vision problems associated with diabetes. Early detection and treatment is critical in reducing

vision problems and preventing blindness. According to the National Eye Institute, over 40% of individuals with diabetes will have some type of diabetic retinopathy.

This program provides a full scope of diabetic eye care including screenings, exams, surgeries and medications – all of which are included in the program.

What is diabetic retinopathy?

Diabetic retinopathy affects blood vessels in the light-sensitive tissue called the retina that lines the back of the eye. It is the most common cause of vision loss among people with diabetes and the leading cause of vision impairment and blindness among working-age adults.

SENIORS VISION CARE

oss of vision is one of the most feared complications of aging. Approximately one in 28 U.S. adults older than 40 years is visually impaired. With a rapidly aging population, the number of persons with visual impairment in the United States and worldwide is expected to increase significantly in the next decade. Seniors with low vision are at a high risk of depression, medication errors, injury, and isolation. It is important for seniors to maintain their vision care. However, 1 in 4 Central Texas older adults have income at or below 200% of the poverty threshold and are likely to experience some type of economic hardship, thus making it difficult to afford vision care.

Our program, I Care Global Missions, now supports comprehensive medical missions in such countries as Bolivia, Colombia, Peru, Ecuador, Brazil, Honduras, Mexico, Ethiopia, Rwanda, Zambia, Philippines, and India. Hundreds of volunteers serve thousands of patients and receive the blessings that come from serving others. I Care San Antonio was formed to provide volunteer

opportunities after its founders experienced the life changing effects of using our talents and resources to serve others. Since its founding in the early 90s, over 400 different people from the San Antonio area have participated in foreign missions and countless more have volunteered in our local clinics. Teaming with Medical Ministries International and serving our local community, over 168,000 people have received eye care. By teaming with MMI, we are able to carry Jesus' life changing message and care to many thousands more.




