It's the year where our generous donors, like you, stepped up and helped us reach our financial goals to keep operations running smoothly. I Care San Antonio's Vision Center is the only charity eye clinic in the United States managed by volunteer doctors providing such a high level and extensive amount of care. #### The Gift of Sight

I Care San Antonio, founded in 1992, is a faith-based, medical non-profit organization managed primarily by volunteer doctors.

Locally, we accomplish our mission by providing complete eye care at the I Care Vision Center located next to Haven for Hope, a 22 acre homeless campus in downtown San Antonio. This program serves all low income (150% and below the federal guidelines on poverty) and homeless people in Bexar and the surrounding counties who do not have any type of health insurance or have health insurance with a deductible so high compared to their income, it acts as a barrier to receiving vision care.

Internationally, we partner with Medical Ministries International to co-sponsor over 50 medical mission trips. In addition, each year, we lead a team to assist with vision care in an impoverished country.

## **CHILDREN'S VISION PROGRAM**



**The iCare4kids Vision Program** impacts children throughout Bexar and the surrounding ten counties by detecting and treating eye and vision problems, improving their development, learning, safety and confidence – helping them "see" a brighter future! Further impact of the iCare4kids Vision program eases the financial and emotional stress of parents and caregivers who do not have eye care insurance for their children.

## **EYE ON DIABETES**

**Eye on Diabetes** is a vision program that provides comprehensive eye care, from screenings to surgeries, for people with diabetes living in poverty.

hen it comes to the health problems deemed "epidemic" in Bexar County – diabetes is at the top of the list. The portion of adults who have diabetes has steadily increased to 14% of Bexar County's population, which amounts to 255,600 people living with this debilitating disease.

The goal of the Eye on Diabetes program is to help diagnose, prevent and treat vision problems

associated with diabetes. Early detection and treatment is critical in reducing vision problems and preventing blindness. According to the National Eye Institute, over 40% of individuals with diabetes will have some type of diabetic retinopathy.

This program provides a full scope of diabetic eye care including screenings, exams, surgeries and medications.

### What is diabetic retinopathy?

Diabetic retinopathy affects blood vessels in the light-sensitive tissue called the retina that lines the back of the eye. It is the most common cause of vision loss among people with diabetes and the leading cause of vision impairment and blindness among working-age adults.



## SENIOR VISION CARE

oss of vision is one of the most feared complications of aging. Approximately one in 28 U.S. adults older than 40 years is visually impaired. With a rapidly aging population, the number of persons with visual impairment in the United States and worldwide is expected to increase significantly in the next decade. Seniors with low vision are at a high risk of depression, medication errors, injury, and isolation. It is important for seniors to maintain their vision care. however, one in four Central Texas older adults have income at or below 200% of the poverty threshold and are likely to experience some type of economic hardship, thus making it difficult to afford vision care.

## **ALL STAR EYE CARE PROGRAM**



Through the All Star Eye Care Program, I Care San Antonio ensures eye health care equity to our most vulnerable veteran families. Expanding coverage

and supporting outreach efforts doesn't just help veterans – it helps their families. Often, it's assumed that all veterans are covered by Veteran Affair (VA) insurance, but only 47% of Texas veterans are enrolled in VA coverage. Eligibility for VA coverage varies, depending on several factors such as the years of a member's service and the level of his or her disability. Moreover, VA coverage does not usually extend to family members.

In just the second year of the launch of this program, I Care San Antonio provided a total value of care of \$290,339 with a 13% increase in patient visits – *all during a pandemic*.

## **GLOBAL MISSIONS**

### International Missions Forms Compassionate Care at Home

Seven years ago, I Care's co-founder, Doug Radcliffe, asked if I would consider becoming a board member. After some interviews and a site visit, I said "yes", and it came to pass. While my board service will end in the next year or two, my association with I Care, God willing, will continue until my last breath. It is pure joy to humble oneself in service to others. I'm convinced it's the secret sauce that keeps our amazing staff and volunteer doctors and technicians devoted to the hard work they do, day in and day out.

About three years into my service at I Care, Dr. Robert Rice asked if my wife, Mary, and I would be interested in going on a mission trip with Medical Ministry International, "MMI". I was well acquainted with what MMI was about, given I Care's long relationship with and support of MMI ... but neither Mary nor I had ever been "in the field." After some thought and prayer, we decided to go to Arequipa, Peru for a two-week vision mission trip. About sixty or so volunteers, including many doctors, nurses and technicians met the needs of over 3,000 patients and performed about 150 surgeries.

Our intention was to help others. The days were long and usually on our feet. My teammates and I at "Station 3" measured the vision of about 250-300 persons a day. Good thing I Care's Executive Director, Libby Bentley, was one of my teammates; the learning curve was steep. Mary worked at a station that, among other things, changed the surgical dressings on patients that had been operated on the day before. It seems nonsensical to say we were exhausted but not tired at the end of each day ... but that's the best I can describe it. There's that secret sauce again. The people we served came from difficult and lowly circumstances in many cases. They showed us such extraordinary love and gratitude for the little we were doing to help them. We were the ones that were supposed to be doing the giving, yet at the end of the day it felt as if the ledger were reversed. We, and I mean every one of us, had received far more than we gave. I am convinced it was God blessing us all; the servers and the served.

Despite the ravages of the pandemic ... and rest assured the people we serve

at home and abroad are the hardest hit ... I Care (as well as MMI) never quit serving those in need. Whether it was the support for indigenous teams abroad, in the case of MMI, or keeping the I Care Vision Center open and the lights on. Both organizations exhibited a steely determination to press on, and with God's help we did, are, and will continue to do so with even greater determination. To borrow the name of the classic book of meditations by Oswald Chambers, "My Utmost for His Highest".

Mary's and my overseas mission experiences translate 1:1 to the work I Care does in our community. Absolutely no difference. "Leaving the Village" has only opened my eyes wider to how important it is to be aware of my privilege and to not let it be the thing I worship, lest it be my undoing. I now better see that privilege—the bountiful life I/we can live—as a tool that gives us the time, talent, and treasure to humble ourselves in service ... at home and abroad.




