For over twenty-five years, I Care San Antonio has been improving lives by providing complete eye care to our most vulnerable children.

In 2019, we partnered with over 98 schools to provide vision care to their students. In addition, we had the pleasure of supporting Texans Can Academies to help fulfill their mission of providing every student the opportunity to pursue their dreams while removing barriers that keep them from attaining their education. Along with focusing on children, we launched an exciting new initiative, **All Star Eye Care for Veterans and their Families**. This program helps low-income and homeless U.S. military veterans and their immediate family members access complete eye care including medical, surgical and optical ... **because when one member joins the military the whole family serves.**

Across the nation, disparities in access to healthcare continue to

be large, persistent and increasing, especially for our children and veterans. Because of your help, the I Care Vision Center is improving our community's health equity and striving to bridge these gaps by focusing on direct patient care. I Care San Antonio continues to be the consistent vision care provider to those who cannot afford it. Our mission is to remove the barriers and fill the gap of providing complete eye care to those who are uninsured and the growing underinsured population. We are only able to accomplish these goals because of our generous donors and outstanding volunteer doctors who dedicate their time and resources both in Central Texas at the I Care Vision Center in San Antonio and internationally through our Global Medical Missions program in 19 different countries.

In this annual report, we are pleased to highlight our accomplishments in 2019, which was our most impactful year yet. I Care San Antonio's volunteer doctors performed over 789 major eye procedures including laser, cataract and retina surgeries. The total value of all donated eye care was over an impressive **\$1.3 million**. Internationally, we co-sponsored **\$20 million** worth of healthcare through our partnership with Medical Ministry

International and the direct impact in our patients' lives is immeasurable.

We depend on, and are grateful for, all you do to support I Care San Antonio. Your kindness enables our work every day.

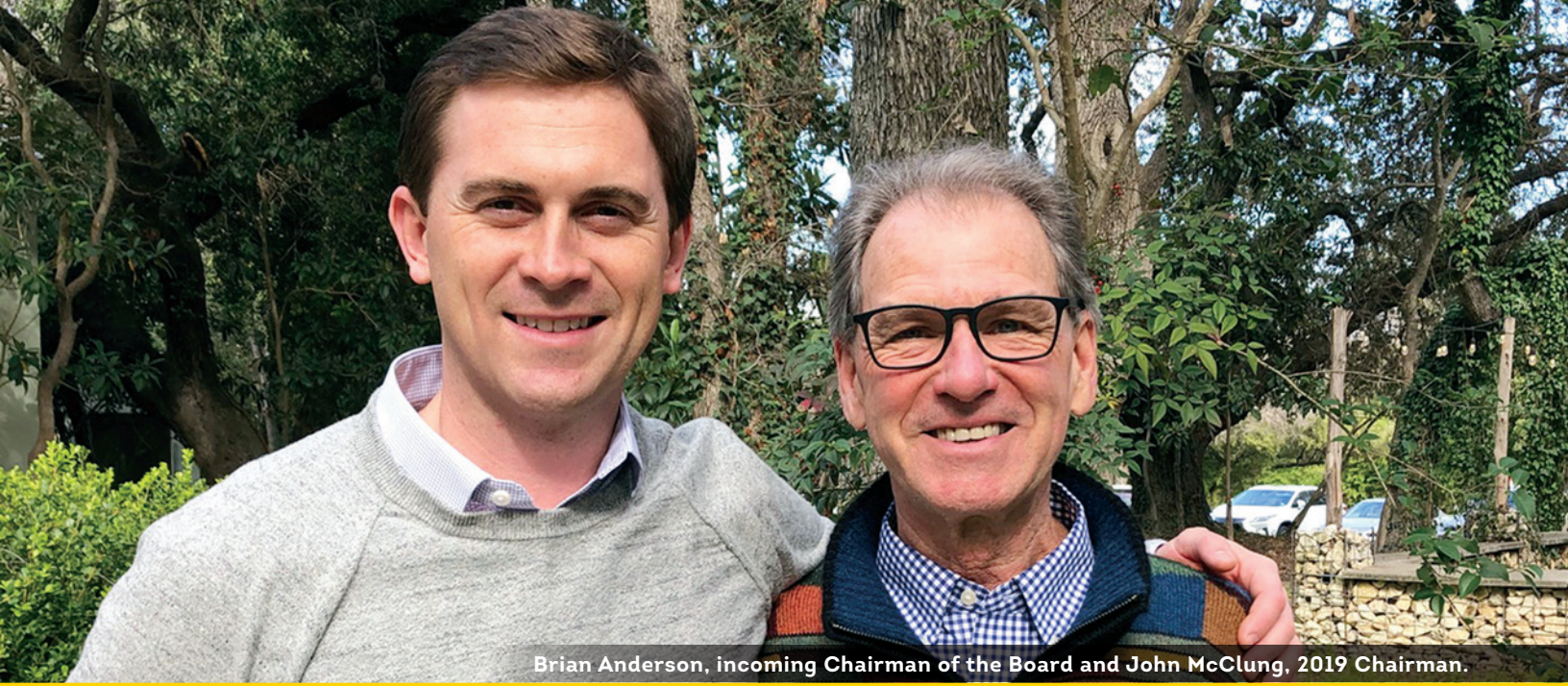

A significant portion of this grant has allowed us to purchase and deploy a first-in-the-nation wide field retina camera; an amazing device that allows our doctors to see far more of the retina than ever before, leading to earlier diagnosis and treatment of retina disease.

All this good news notwithstanding, our growth in 2019 and our unrelenting efforts to serve more people in need will require more money from more individuals and organizations. Operations are becoming more complicated and costly due to numerous changes affecting all clinical medical practitioners. With God's providence, and your support, I'm sure I Care San Antonio will continue to do good work and more of it.

The Gift of Sight

I Care San Antonio, founded in 1992, is a faith-based, medical non-profit organization managed primarily by volunteer doctors.

Locally, we accomplish our mission by providing complete eye care at the I Care Vision Center located next to the Haven for Hope campus. This program serves low income (150% and below the federal guidelines on poverty) and homeless people in Bexar and the surrounding counties who do not have any type of health insurance or have health insurance with a deductible so high compared to their income, it acts as a barrier to receiving vision care.

Internationally, we partner with Medical Ministries International to co-sponsor over 50 medical

mission trips. In addition, each year, we lead a team to assist with vision care in an impoverished country.

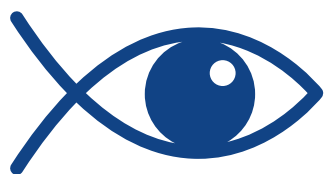

EYE ON DIABETES

***Eye on Diabetes** is a vision program that provides comprehensive eye care, from screenings to surgeries, for people with diabetes living in poverty.*

When it comes to the health problems deemed “epidemic” in Bexar County – diabetes is at the top of the list. The portion of adults who have diabetes has steadily increased to 14% of Bexar County’s population, which amounts to 255,600 people living with this debilitating disease.

The goal of the Eye on Diabetes program is to help diagnose, prevent and treat vision problems associated

with diabetes. Early detection and treatment is critical in reducing vision problems and preventing blindness. According to the National Eye Institute, over 40% of individuals with diabetes will have some type of diabetic retinopathy.

This program provides a full scope of diabetic eye care including screenings, exams, surgeries and medications – all of which are included in the program.



Special thanks to the Kronkosky Charitable Foundation for helping I Care in purchasing an Ultra-Wide Field Imaging system which helps in the assessment of diabetic retinopathy giving a 200 degree view.

What is diabetic retinopathy?

Diabetic retinopathy affects blood vessels in the light-sensitive tissue called the retina that lines the back of the eye. It is the most common cause of vision loss among people with diabetes and the leading cause of vision impairment and blindness among working-age adults.



SENIOR VISION CARE

Loss of vision is one of the most feared complications of aging. Approximately one in 28 U.S. adults older than 40 years is visually impaired. With a rapidly aging population, the number of persons with visual impairment in the United States and worldwide is expected to increase significantly in the next decade. Seniors with low vision are at a high risk of depression, medication errors, injury, and isolation. It is important for seniors to maintain their vision care, however, one in four Central Texas older adults have income at or below 200% of the poverty threshold and are likely to experience some type of economic hardship, thus making it difficult to afford vision care.

MEET PHILLIP

"My name is Phillip and I am a United States Army Reserves Veteran. I cannot see completely out of my left eye so when I am walking down the street I have to completely turn my head or turn my body in order to see. This has been a bit of a challenge with safety related issues when I am crossing the street.

I was told I have cataract in my left eye and that I would need surgery."

Since his surgery, Phillip has regained the confidence he once had. He no longer has to fear for his safety when walking down the street or driving commercial and personal vehicles.

I Care San Antonio is dedicated to reducing coverage gaps and removing barriers to care for veteran families through the All Star Eye Care Program. This vision program helps low-income and homeless U.S. military veterans and their immediate family members access timely and complete eye care including medical, surgical and optical.

On November 22, I Care San Antonio hosted its inaugural event, the 2019 O'Dark Thirty Breakfast, benefitting the All Star Eye Care Program for Veterans and Their Families. Over \$100,000 was raised to help provide comprehensive and timely eye care to low-income and homeless veterans and their families. The event's outstanding support not only helped to purchase medical supplies, eyeglasses and offset surgical fees for our underserved veteran families, it also helped ease the financial burden and stress veterans and their families endure when

faced with military separation, civilian transition and caregiver demands.

Steve Spriester, KSAT anchor and longtime supporter of I Care, welcomed the gathering of military supporters to include event co-chairs Bill Greehey, Chairman of Haven for Hope and NuStar Energy, and Byron C. Hepburn, MD, Maj Gen, USAF (Ret), Director of UT Health San Antonio's Military Health Institute as well as event sponsors, active duty and veteran guests.

After Posting the Colors and invocation, guests enjoyed breakfast while viewing the All Star Eye Care video which highlighted the program's grateful patients in addition to its increased area of care, expanded qualifying criteria and extended beneficiaries. Medal of Honor recipient, former U.S. Army Staff Sergeant Sal Giunta shared a powerful keynote message of his story of unwavering courage, the importance

of teamwork, service before self and leadership in the face of overwhelming circumstances. Having friends who have lost their eyesight on the battlefield, Sal encouraged continued support of the All Star Eye Care program, adding "this program gives veterans a chance to get part of their life back."

The morning culminated with John McClung, Chairman of the Board of I Care San Antonio, presenting Sal with a small token of appreciation; an Alcalde and Visionary of the Year award on behalf of all of the board members and the City of San Antonio.

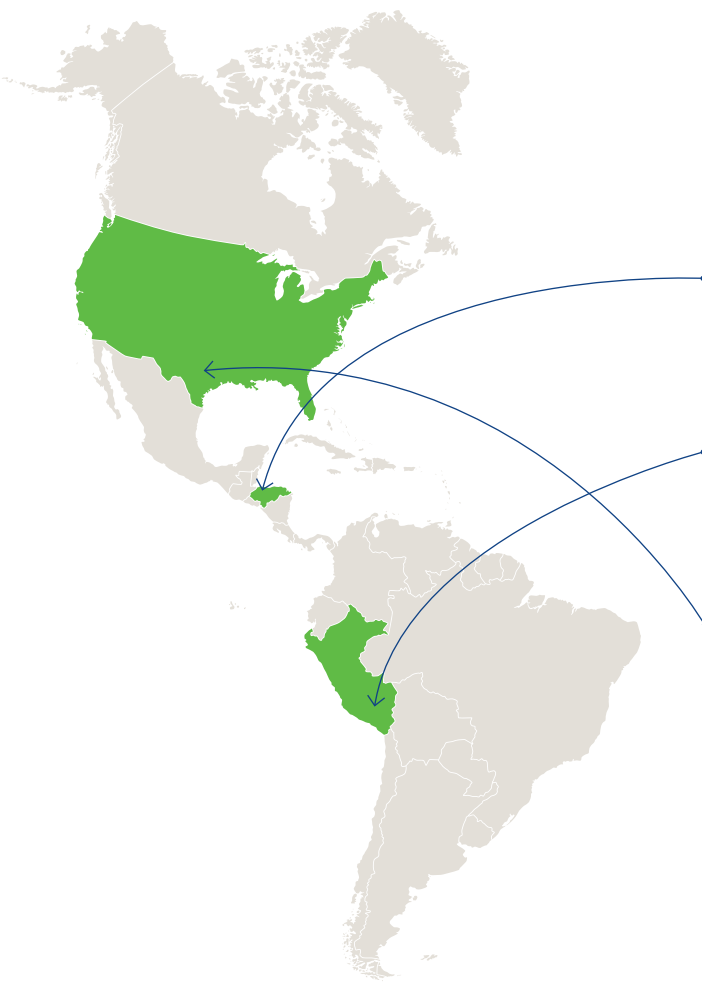

I Care San Antonio sent teams to several international locations in 2019. In February, a small team served in **El Progreso, Honduras** for a week accomplishing 53 cataract procedures.

Later in July, the I Care team led an eye mission composed of 55 people from Canada and the U.S. who joined the national MMI team in **Arequipa, Peru**. The team saw 3,623 patients and dispensed 3,595 glasses. 176 cataract, 24 crossed eye procedures and 19 minor surgeries were performed. 19 laser procedures were done, and 15 prosthesis were fitted.

I Care also sent a team to **Fort Worth** on two occasions to perform 28 cataract procedures at the Christian Assistance Network, a charity organization providing several services to those in need. The patients came from Dallas, Fort Worth, and the surrounding counties.

Thank you to the many companies that support our missions. Without them we could not provide the services to those in need. And thank you to the many individuals and churches that sponsor our teams.

I CARE VISION CENTER'S 10 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

We just passed the 10-year anniversary of opening the I Care Vision Center next to the Haven for Hope. In 2009, we moved into our facility with nine volunteer doctors and one full time and one part time staff members while sharing the space with Prevent Blindness. We were serving under 700 patients a year. My have we grown! Presently in 2020, we have 40 eye doctors performing over 6,000 patient visits to those who have no other place to get high quality eye care. Over 1.3 million dollars worth of care was provided last year by our volunteer doctors and a full-time staff of seven who coordinate and facilitate that care. I Care provides complete eye care from reading and prescription eyeglasses to complex cornea, glaucoma, and retina surgeries. Over 50 cataract surgeries were performed last year, many on functionally blind patients who had no other place to turn. We hold a children's clinic once a year just after school starts and

have typically seen around 250 kids with most receiving new eyeglasses, many for the first time. This year because of increased screening of pre-school children, we had well over 600 applications for our services requiring a ramped-up children's program. The eye doctors in our community have stepped up to meet the growing demand. We are truly blessed with generous doctors with big hearts willing to give of their time and talents to those who are in need.

Our community suffers from a high incidence of diabetes that can devastate the eyes. Many patients have no place to turn except the I Care Vision Center. We have a group of dedicated retinal specialists that work tirelessly at providing top quality care to those patients. But the need keeps increasing each year.

We also support international teams that are organized by Medical Ministry International. We send a team to Peru each summer and provide eye care

to thousands of Peruvians. We are helping the Peru MMI team to build a much-needed medical center to house their medical, dental, optical and physical therapy program that is one of the best in Peru.

Of course, all of this costs money. In 2008 our budget was around \$50,000. Now it is well over half a million dollars. We are indebted to the many donors, individuals, corporations, churches, and foundations that help us provide the vital eye care locally and around the world. But with the varied services we provide, our financial needs are growing. We ask for your help in providing sight to those in need so that they can have a better life.
