from the President's Desk

Dear Friends,

I am honored to reflect on the last twenty years with I Care San Antonio. For me this journey began in the summer of 1989 when I responded to an appeal from Betsey Rice for volunteers to go on a two week medical eye mission to Guanajuato, Mexico. Little did I know that two week mission trip was just the start of a much longer journey.

Those early days of annual two week eye mission trips into the devastatingly poor parts of rural Mexico were transformational for me and my faith walk, but not in any way that I had envisioned at the time. I thought that the right thing for me to do was to give back to others a few of the blessings that God had given me. What happened instead was that I was so much more blessed by the people we were serving. To be part of an effort that gives sight to people who are so grateful that they grab you with a spontaneous hug or start crying with tears of joy or watch their eyes light up through a pair of glasses someone else had donated changed my whole perspective.

This change of heart wasn't unique to me; I could see the transformational effect it had in most of the volunteers around me. It was so powerful in fact that Dr. Rice and I started to collaborate on how we could expand the volunteer experience to people back home who couldn't spend 2 weeks a year in remote areas of third world countries. We started with a free eye clinic for the homeless one Saturday a month using Dr. Rice's office and equipment. We then started organizing weekend eye mission trips to the border towns in Mexico which would include an evangelism component. We continued these efforts and expanded our local clinics to include the working poor. After a few years of operating out of church basements and borrowed medical offices, the vision emerged for us to have our own permanent eye clinic in San Antonio.

Although many of the transitions through the years seemed monumental at the time, looking back now the growth was gradual and steady. God always seemed to put the right people and resources in our path when it was needed. After three major moves, we finally have a place we call home at San Antonio's homeless complex, called Haven for Hope. After all these years, our core values are still the same, to share Jesus, the light of the world with volunteers and the less fortunate that we have the privilege to serve. Our focus hasn't changed either, which is to provide excellent eye care, in the best facility, to the homeless and low income families of San Antonio.

So we take a moment to reflect and to celebrate the journey that God has put us on, the many friends we have had the honor to work with, and the joyful blessings we have received! We couldn't have done it without the help and support of many people who I would love to name here, but the list is too long. However, if you come by the clinic we have a marvelous visionary wall where we celebrate the people who made this all possible!

Our International Caring Mission

I Care San Antonio participated in another international mission trip early this year. Our team from San Antonio included Dr. Kathy Hubbard, Rhonda Ullom, Mari Saenz, Laura Vigil, Jana Waters, Terri Politi , Betsey and Bob Rice. Sponsored by Medical Ministry International (MMI), the team of 57 N. Americans (US and Canada) and 10 Bolivian MMI staff served 4,719 people during our 9 days of clinic in Sucre, Bolivia. 3,805 glasses were dispensed, 280 surgeries and 26 laser procedures were performed, and 23 artificial eyes were fitted.

These are incredible numbers because we had a great, hardworking, compassionate team guided and inspired by our Lord Jesus. I am always humbled by the trust our patients have to allow us, total

strangers, the privilege to perform surgery on their eyes with only local anesthesia. The numbers are impressive but it's the individual stories that touch our hearts and make the trip so worthwhile.

My favorite patient was a tiny lady in her 90s who is wheelchair bound and who I had to carry from pre-op area to the operating room. After removing her patch the next day, her face lit up, she threw up her hands and praised God over and over again. Another lady had lost her sight at age 15 due to cataracts. At age 85, we removed one of her cataracts and for the first time, she was able to see her nephew whom she only knew by his voice. How incredible!! One 6-year old

beautiful girl started singing after receiving her glasses. Her mom said she loves to sing and encouraged her to serenade us. Our hearts were touched.

Sucre, Bolivia, is a lovely Spanish Colonial city located at 9,000 feet in the Andes. Most of the Canadian team we join are veterans of MMI and feel like family. The fellowship is wonderful. The local Rotary Club sponsored

our stay and we renewed friendships made last year.

We have worked with the Bolivian MMI team for three years and we are blessed by the relationships we have made and appreciate the hard work they do for our mission before, during and after our visit. They are all committed Christians and they engage the people with discussions about the Gospel of Christ. Next summer we will be traveling to Peru and resuming our friendships with the wonderful MMI team we joined last summer. We will be working together in the name of Jesus to improve the eyesight of Peruvians in need. We'll fly to Arequipa, Peru, on 18 July, 2014 for a two week eye mission.

I often wonder what life is all about. In the Christian faith, it boils down

to giving glory to God in all we do while enjoying His presence and blessings. We do this in the Judeo-Christian tradition by being obedient to God, loving Him

> with all our heart, soul, mind and strength and loving our neighbors as ourselves. But how do we love God and love our neighbor? One primary way is to serve others in the name of God. in I Care is spelled with the letter I to represent the difference each person can make in helping someone else. And that is what I plan to do.

Last year I Care San Antonio distributed over 2,000 pairs of glasses, which the organization has to pay for. They also distribute used glasses to patients who need glasses immediately and cannot wait for the usual 2 weeks for the lab. These used glasses help these folks get back to work right away.

For example – there have been construction workers who have broken their glasses and are not allowed on the job site without their glasses. There are also cooks who are required to wear glasses. If these folks don't have their glasses, they can't go to work to support themselves or their families.

In addition, I Care San Antonio distributes approximately 50 pairs of reader glasses each month to Haven for Hope members so they can better attend their important training classes and read their bibles.

This project is important to me because I have worn glasses since I was 4 years old. I have also had eye surgery. Helping people through I Care San Antonio was perfect for my confirmation project.

My goal is to collect 100 pairs of reading glasses for I Care San Antonio to distribute.

I am so excited about this project and the lives that I hope to change and help. Thank you so much for all of your support!

ICSA focuses on the Ophthalmic Assistant Professionals by launching a new training program

ICSA's Ophthalmic Assistant Training program has attracted many talented students.

2013 was a progressive year for I Care San Antonio as we launched our Ophthalmic Assistant Training program. In our first year, 17 students enrolled.

The program began in February and will conclude in December. Each student will take an examination on line from the American Academy of Ophthalmology. After they pass that examination, they will be eligible to apply for their Certified Ophthalmic Assistant exam offered by the Joint Commission on Allied Health Personnel in Ophthalmology. Each student should be certified by the end of 2013 or the beginning of 2014.

All the students have learned a tremendous amount. Three of the students have found new employment opportunities in ophthalmology that they weren't previously trained for. Several of the students have improved at their existing employments. Two students reported that their corporate optometry office was rated the poorest technical staff in the city and now is rated the top technical staff in the city. These students have worked particularly hard in their studies and clinical rotations. Their employers are certainly reaping the benefit. Most importantly the patients are experiencing the benefit of a well trained and educated technician.

We have also put on four workshops this past year to raise funds for our training program. These were both informative and profitable. We plan on doing this again next year but with the addition of JCAHPO certification credits for the workshops. This will allow all our newly certified technicians to get in their continuing credit hours at a reasonable price.

The next step is JCAHPO accredited CEC's in 2014 for our workshops. Then school accreditation in 2015 after going with the curriculum we will use for the next three years.

I Care San Antonio and the volunteer doctors have benefited greatly from our talented students. They each have a goal of working eight hours a month in the charity clinics. One of our students even went on an eye mission trip this past year. These students are embracing God's outreach in our community and the world beyond.
